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What You and Your Service Facilitator Should be Discussing

1. New for this period:

- If you are on the CCC Plus Waiver, did you know that you could also be on the waiting list for one of the three new waivers (Building Independence, Family and Individual Supports or Community Living)? How to apply for the FIS or CL Waiver.
- 2. Review Mobility and Behavior/Orientation levels as noted on our reports. Are they accurately reflecting your reality?
- 3. You can now enroll attendants online. See PPL Section.

2. At every visit:

- 1. Are you enrolled in Commonwealth Coordinated Care (CCC) Program? If so, which Managed Care Organization (MCO) are you using?
- 2. Are there any medical and/or functional changes?
- 3. Who are your attendants and are they getting paid?
- 4. Have there been any recent hospitalizations?
- 5. Turning 18? We have an amazing Resource Page for Young Adults!
- 6. Reviewing time sheets filled out by your attendants.

Waivers

Personal Care Service Changes

Starting September 1, 2018, individuals who are <u>under the age of 21</u> that are on the <u>CCC Plus Waiver</u> and receiving Consumer-Directed Personal Care services will have their Personal Care authorizations moved to the <u>Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnosis and Treatment</u> (<u>EPSDT</u>) Medicaid program. This is a change by Department of Medical Assistance Services (DMAS).

What you need to know:

- Those impacted will receive a form known as the DMAS-7 from their Moms In Motion Service Facilitator. It is important that when you receive this form that you get it to the physician to complete as soon as possible and follow up to be sure it is completed.
- The DMAS-7 will need to be filled out by a pediatrician, developmental pediatrician, or a primary care physician. Please be aware that a specialist cannot complete it. <u>Download a</u> <u>blank DMAS-7</u>
- If you have not seen your doctor in over a year, you may be asked to make an appointment.
- Moms In Motion must receive the form back in order to reauthorize your Personal Care services. Without this authorization, your Personal Care Attendant may not get paid in a timely manner.
- You will need to communicate with your physician the number of Personal Care Attendant
 hours you currently receive each week and the schedule, as that is required information on
 that form. You may need to advocate to the physician to document that there are no changes
 to attendant hours.
- In order to maintain eligibility for your Consumer-Directed Medicaid Waiver, you are required to use a waiver service at least once every 30 days. Since Personal Care will be moved under EPSDT (a Medicaid program, not a waiver program), that will no longer be a Waiver service. Because of this, you will need to have at least one other service in addition to EPSDT personal care hours. Respite meets that requirement for most, but if you do not receive respite hours you will need to make sure you are using another waiver service.

Some examples of other services are:

- · Adult Day Health Care
- Assistive Technology
- Environmental Modifications
- Medication Monitoring
- Personal Emergency Response System (PERS)
- Private Duty Nursing Services
- Respite Care
- Skilled and Intermediate (custodial) nursing facility or long stay hospital
- Transition Services (moving into the community and out of a nursing facility)

MCO Open Enrollment

Open enrollment starts October 1, 2018. Look for letters in your mail for MCO open enrollment soon. If you do choose to switch MCOs, there's no lapse of service but there will be most likely be a delay of attendant pay.

It is **important** that you tell your Moms In Moms In Motion Service Facilitator you switch MCOs! Moms In Motion needs to know to be able to send authorization requests to your new MCO choice. The MCO approves authorizations and then sends it to PPL.

Community Mental Health Services: Mental Health Skill Building Services (MHSS)

On January 1, 2018, Department of Medical Assistance Services (DMAS) has enacted a benefit carve-in for Community Mental Health and Rehabilitation Services (CMHRS). This means that all six CCC Plus health plans will assume responsibility for the administration of these services. CMHRS are behavioral health interventions intended to provide clinical treatment to those individuals with significant mental illness or children with, or at risk of developing, serious emotional disturbances.

The Mental Health Skill Building Services (MHSS) program is available to adults who live independently. Those whose <u>DD Waiver services</u> enable them to live fairly independently may benefit tremendously from MHSS. It offers one-on-one training and reinforcement of functional skills and appropriate behavior related to their health and safety, monitoring and education regarding mental health, nutrition, and physical condition and increased connection with community resources up to ten hours per week.

Basic Medicaid (<u>CCC Plus Waiver</u>) covers both <u>Community Service Boards (CSB)</u> and private provider Mental Health Day Support (technically "Medically Necessary" Psycho-Social Rehabilitation) and MHSS. For individuals having a co-occurring mental illness a Mental Health Day Support program may be a better fit than a DD Day Support program and MHSS may be a more beneficial service than DD Waiver In-Home Support Services. You can find CSB and private providers for these programs on the Virginia Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services (DBHDS) <u>website</u>. Persons without a DD Waiver may also be eligible for CSB Mental Health Case Management but this is not necessarily a requirement for enrollment in these programs. Those who have a DD Waiver cannot utilize both DD Waiver In-Home Support Services and MHSS.

To access Mental Health Day Support services a Primary Care Provider or a psychiatrist will need to document the applicant's DSM Axis I diagnosis, Mental Health history, current medications and need for the program services. Qualifying for MHSS appears to be quite restrictive. However, some wiggle room exists for documenting comparable required prior treatment history such as Mental Health services received at an earlier time, in another state, adolescent Mental Health In-Home services, various adult crisis services, etc. (Be sure to ask the Primary Care Physician or other health care providers to tailor their remarks to the program eligibility criteria and the applicant's need for services.)

An individual on the DD Waiver wait list who has a co-occurring mental illness may be eligible for a Mental Health Day Support Program, receive MHSS and/or CCC Plus Waiver Consumer-Directed Personal Care Services in the evenings and on weekends and could also participate in The Virginia Department for Aging and Rehabilitative Services (DARS) work readiness or supported employment program all of which will ease the wait on the DD Waiver wait List.

Community Mental Health Services includes:

- Mental health day treatment/partial hospitalization
- Intensive community treatment
- Psychosocial rehabilitation
- Mental Health Skill Building Service (MHSS) which includes assistance with budgeting and financial skills, household management skills like healthy meal planning, food preparation and organizational skills, as well as effective communication skills and anger and stress management.
- Crisis stabilization, or
- Crisis intervention services
- Practical experience in providing direct services to individuals with diagnoses of mental illness or intellectual disability or the provision of direct geriatric services or special education services.

Mental Health Skill Building Service (MHSS) addresses the needs of individuals who are

experiencing difficulty functioning in their daily lives. Reimbursed by Medicaid, MHSS provides a multitude of interventions designed to help individuals live a more independent lifestyle by improving their overall daily functioning.

Adult MHSS Eligibility Criteria

To qualify for MHSS, individuals 21 and older must meet the criteria for each of the following items:

- Clinical necessity
- Qualifying mental health diagnosis
- Need for goal-directed training
- Prior history of a qualifying higher level of care
- Prior history of a qualifying prescription within the past 12 months

Children MHSS Eligibility Criteria

Individuals younger than 21 years of age must meet the criteria for the following items in addition to the above items:

- Living situation Can not be living in a supervised setting as defined in §63.2-905.1 of the Code of Virginia
- Must be transitioning into an independent living situation
- Independent Clinical Assessment (ICA)

Preparing for Back to School

History:

The Individualized Education Program, commonly referred to as an IEP, is mandated by the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). IDEA is a United States federal law that governs how states and public agencies provide early intervention and special education. Before IDEA of 1990, there

was Education for All Handicapped Children Act of 1975. Also, there is section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, which is a civil rights law designed to eliminate discrimination on the basis of disability in any program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance. Section 504 guarantees certain rights to individuals with disabilities, including the right to full participation and access to a Free and Appropriate Public Education (FAPE).

Federal Report on Guardianship

Guardianship generally involves a state-court determination which finds the individual lacks the capacity to make decisions with respect to their health, safety, welfare, and/or property. Although guardianship is governed by state law, it entails the removal of rights protected by the U.S. Constitution. Additionally, individuals who are subject to guardianship are also protected by the Americans with Disabilities Act and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act. Those laws are intended to increase the ability of individuals to live and work in the community, encourage participation in civic life, and to promote self-determination for individuals with disabilities.

<u>The Beyond Guardianship Report National Council on Disability</u> explains how guardianship law has evolved, explores due process and other concerns with guardianships, offers an overview of alternatives to guardianship.

"NCD chose to examine this topic at depth given the implications for someone's civil rights and liberty under guardianship - that an individual is losing the authority to make decisions regarding where to live, whether to work and where, where to travel, with whom to socialize and how to manage money and property," said Phoebe Ball, a legislative affairs specialist at the National Council on Disability (NCD) who worked on the report. "We need to explore alternatives to guardianship such as supported decision-making that enable people to avoid this civil death."

Medicaid Expansion

On June 7, 2018, Virginia joined 32 other states and the District of Columbia in expanding Medicaid under the Affordable Care Act to adults with incomes at or below 138% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL). After rejecting Medicaid expansion for several years, Virginia's Republican-led State Legislature passed a budget bill that authorizes expansion. Virginia's Medicaid expansion will extend coverage to an estimated 400,000 Virginians. The new coverage is slated to start January 1, 2019.

A shift in the State Legislature's composition was a significant factor behind the bipartisan legislative support. Democrats gained 15 seats in the House in the November 2017 elections, giving Republicans a one-vote majority in both chambers and positioning Lieutenant Governor Justin Fairfax (D) as the tie-breaking vote in the Senate. Newly elected Governor Ralph Northam (D) expressed strong support for Medicaid expansion throughout his campaign and made it a high priority of his first 100 days in office.

The Arc of Northern Virginia has put together an incredible document to introduce individuals to consumer direction. Starting on page 8 of the document, there are very valuable insights into finding and managing qualified care providers. (Remember they are located in Northern Virginia so the reimbursement rate is only relevant to Northern Virginia.)
